By combining found objects with those she has carefully fabricated, Kathryn Andrews draws the viewer's attention to the materiality of symbolic forms. Andrews' gestures ask viewers to collapse their metonymic impulse, replacing it with a refreshed sense of how we relate, both physically and conceptually, to

In historical terms, the practice engages the legacies of minimalism and Pop Art, but complicates them by introducing relationships that exceed the parameters of the exhibition context. Andrews' interest lies in subverting economic exchanges, building an increased awareness of the temporal into otherwise static artworks, and exploring the relationship between popular or archetypal images and abstract form. The presence of a body, whether actual or implied, is often required to activate the symbolic relationships latent in objects. Sculpture thereby becomes an armature for performative action, and a ground against which the passage of time can be observed.
